12 JUN 1915

I Owen Coyle residing at the Old Mill Keady Co
Armagh, was present on the 6th January 1915, when No 911 Private
John Connolly 2nd Batt Royal Munster Fusiliers was home
on sick leave, and I heard him say to his mother Orlia
Connolly and to his sister Annie Connolly, that in the
event of anything happening to him (that is in the event of his
being killed in action) that he would leave anything
he died possessed of to his mother, and if she would
die before he would, that he would leave all he possessed
at his death to his sister Annie Connolly, as it was
~~he~~ ^{she} who worked and helped his mother to rear him, and
it was ~~he~~ ^{she} who remained with and cared his mother.

This statement was made also in the presence of
John and Mary Connolly who reside at the Old Mill
Keady with whom I am boarding.
